Scorecard: employee engagement index

The employee engagement index is a score out of 100. It is a weighting of all engagement question responses.

The weightings for each engagement response are:

- strongly agree is 100 points
- agree is 75 points
- neither agree nor disagree is 50 points
- disagree is 25 points
- strongly disagree is 0 points

High engagement may lead to greater satisfaction and lower absences, turnover and workplace stress.

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
























